#### **BIOGRAPHY:**

Ken Jeffers' career spans over 45 years in which he has worked with diverse communities, individuals, agencies, and organizations in the field of recreation and community development providing training, program design, implementation, and evaluation.

Ken was the Manager of the Access and Diversity Unit in Parks, Forestry and Recreation, City of Toronto with management responsibility for all aspects of equity, diversity and human rights related to the delivery of programs, services, and activities.

Ken has recognized the need for greater outreach and participation by culturally and racially diverse communities through his work. Some of his major responsibilities include but are not limited to, training for all levels of staff, including senior management, active leadership on the Interdivisional Staff Teams on Access, Equity and Human Rights, chairing Corporate, Staff Team on Immigration and Settlement, and the development of a succession plan with an emphasis on equity and diversity.

Ken Jeffers has developed unique community recreation models, in which, recreation and leisure have been used as vehicles in the personal development of Toronto's residents. On behalf of the City of Toronto, Ken has initiated access and equity programs by introducing sports and recreation to diverse groups and cultures: *Hockey in the Neighbourhood, a Citywide basketball league, Swim for It* (an aquatics program for employment for diverse communities), *Beach Volleyball, Introduction of Baseball to diverse youth, Toronto Raptor ball, Cricket Across the Pond, Operational Cricket, Sharing Sports and* the introduction of the *steel band music* to the school system as a credit course.

In his capacity as a community leader, Ken Jeffers was responsible for forming the *Harriet Tubman Community Organization* (1973), one of the first African Canadian Multi-Service Centres in Toronto and developed special initiatives in Public Housing.

Finally, Ken has presented several proposed recommendations on behalf of the African Canadian community in Ottawa to the Justice Ministry in their reform of the *Alternative Measures program*. He created a unique concept and approach to counselling for African Canadian youth called Heritage Counselling which integrates traditional forms of counseling with the understanding of heritage as a positive motivator for change. This program has existed with the Ministry of Corrections probation service for the last 4 years.

In 2006 Ken Jeffers received a special invitation from the Mayor of New York City and represented the City at an international conference of Global Partners entitled *Governing a Diverse City in a Democratic Society*.

  - Obtained a track scholarship to South Carolina State College and joined the Black Awareness Committee, a civil rights group on campus whose primary objective was to desegregate the Jim Crow laws of the South where Blacks were forbidden to participate as equals to whites. He became one of the leading activists who were constantly under threat of the police and the KKK.
  - Organized boycotts of businesses that would not hire Black people and mobilized five other students to run 40 (forty) miles and protest the police killings of three students, one high school student and two student friends and acquaintances (see Toronto Star's "This is no longer my fight" on Ken's return for the 40th anniversary by Royson James: http://www.thestar.com/article/301985).
